

## 2021-2022 Program of Studies (32 academic credits)- MA

### *Course of Study*

The MA program consists of 32 credits over two consecutive semesters as per the table below. Students will be expected to conclude all courses for credit with a grade based on either an exam or a written paper.

In HUJI, each credit equals one academic hour per semester. It is advisory to balance credits between the two semester (i.e. 16 credits in each semester) taking not more than 18 credits in a semester. Courses' sessions have different formats according to the following abbreviations:

**FT** Full time – weekly or biweekly sessions throughout the semester once or twice a week.

**7W/8W** Weekly or biweekly sessions throughout the first 7/8 weeks of the semester.

**ESW** Every second week – sessions will take place throughout the year every second week.

**CC** Condensed courses – 4 to 8 sessions over the course of approximately two weeks within the allocated semester. For exact dates and time see the English course info table.

**OL + WT** Online course with a weekly tutorial. Online materials may be available before the beginning of the semester.

#### M.A. Thesis

We are offering the students the possibility of pursuing a research track, followed by the submission of a Thesis. Successful completion of the entire track, including the Thesis, would be reflected in the Graduation Certificate. The thesis grade will amount to 40% of the final M.A./LL.M grade. Acceptance to the research track will be based on your grades from the first semester. Students with an average of 85 and above will be eligible to apply in the beginning of the second semester.
