## Trauma and Resilience from the Israeli Perspective

This course will give the students an in depth understanding of how people cope with traumatic experiences, of the concept and practice of resilience, of possible pathologies that result from traumatic experiences and of intervention and therapies that help people cope.

### Learning objectives

Students will learn to

1. Understand the essence of traumatic experiences and survival mode
2. Recognize the patterns of healthy coping with trauma
3. Know the different ways to define resilience
4. Explore ways to strengthen resilience of adults and children
5. Understand the experience of combat soldiers
6. Recognize the potential psychopathological consequences of trauma
7. Recognize their own reactions and motivations to the field of trauma

### Target Group:

Professionals & Advanced Students of Clinical or Educational Psychology, Neuropsychology, Social Work, Psychiatry, Counseling, Nursing, Medicine, Law, and Public Health, as well as civil servants and clergy.

### Academic Credit

Students can receive Academic Credit for this course and will be graded upon submitting a paper on a topic decided upon with the course lecturers and after payment to Hebrew University.
